Course Description

This course aims to provide students not only with a multifaceted understanding of the historical and institutional background of the Japanese economy, but also with a strong analytical foundation in the core issues facing the economy. We will examine how business practices have evolved over the past century, how various policy decisions have affected the economy, and what the prospects are for Japan's role in the global economy. We will pay special attention to economic trends in the Kansai region.

Course Schedule:

- Week 1. Japan's economic and social structure before the Industrial Revolution
- Week 2. The Japanese economy from the Meiji period to World War II
- Week 3. Japan's post-war economic miracle: the role of large companies and economic policies
- Week 4. Japan's bubble economy and the Heisei era: the lost decades
- Week 5. Japan's evolving economic policy: from state capitalism toward Abenomics and 'new capitalism'
- Week 6. Japan's financial system: the role of mega banks and the evolution of the Japanese capital market
- Week 7. Japan's labor market and demographic challenges: elderly, female, part-time and foreign workers
- Week 8. Japan's social security system: the sustainability of the pension and healthcare systems, and Japan's public debt
- Week 9. Japan's foreign direct investment, and foreign affiliates in Japan
- Week 10. Japan Inc. 2.0: innovation, digital transformation (DX), startup scene and venture companies
- Week 11. The evolution of corporate culture in Japan: working environment, seniority system and recruitment practices
- Week 12. A field trip to a Japanese company and/or a lecture by a guest speaker
- Week 13. The internationalization of the Japanese economy: immigration policies, tourism, and branding strategies
